## **ADMISSION TO EASTERN**

Eastern Senior High School is not an application school. We will provide a rigorous, college preparatory curriculum to all who attend. Current eighth grade students living within Eastern's boundary or attending one of its feeder middle schools must complete annual DC Public Schools enrollment and residency forms in April. Families should complete these documents by June 1, 2012. All other students and families who would like to join the Eastern community must participate in the DC Public Schools Out-of-Boundary Lottery between January 30th, 2011 and February 27th, 2012 for limited seats. Eastern enrolled first time ninth grade students only in the fall of 2011, growing by one grade each year in order to strategically design a rigorous, well-rounded high school experience for every student.

#### THE EASTERN **EXPERIENCE**

The Class of 2015 will embody Excellence, Scholarship, Honor and Service (ESHS) as we build our school culture to develop a confident scholar with a high level of respect for self and others. Our school community will cultivate a commitment to service through opportunities to serve as leaders in the classroom along with meaningful volunteer experiences outside of the school setting.

We also believe that high quality athletics, arts, and music programs alongside college and career exploration opportunities prepare students for post-secondary success. Eastern boasts a rich history of

## ACADEMIC **PROGRAMS AT EASTERN**

All coursework at Eastern will incorporate the principles of analytical reading and writing, effective oral communication, and application of 21st century skills. Students will have open access to a portfolio of academic offerings that include:

### Exposure to College and Careers

Every Eastern freshman will take a daily credit-bearing course called College and Career Advisory. This class will ensure that students have an opportunity to develop skills such as organization and time management. Students will also be guided through designing their four-year graduation plan, finding valuable summer learning experiences, and building collaborative relationships with peers and Eastern faculty. Guest speakers and college trips will provide enrichment and inspiration as students set and reach academic and social goals.

The IB Diploma Program is a globally recognized college preparatory course of study taught in Grades 11 and 12. IB courses encourage international-mindedness and a positive attitude to learning while insisting upon rigorous external standards and an in-depth exploration of six disciplines.

#### **Advanced Placement**

The College Board designed AP classes to expose high school students to college level coursework and obtain university credits for proficiency on a national exam in a specific content area. Eastern will offer AP courses ranging from Calculus to Language and Composition. All students will be encouraged to take at least one Advanced Placement or International Baccalaureate class before graduation.

#### **Health and Medical** Sciences Academy

Students with an interest in preparing for pre-medical studies or for careers in nursing, pharmacy, or emergency response can elect to enroll in this exciting academy that provides an additional course in science each year addressing biomedical issues, human body systems, and medical interventions. The program utilizes the national Project Lead the Way curriculum and supplements rigorous classroom learning with out-of-school activities in the medical field.

Law and Public Policy As early as sophomore year, students may choose to pursue courses that delve into constitutional law, mock trial, debate, and public policy. These electives will not only serve as excellent preparation for Advanced Placement Government in Grade 12, but will also provide the content knowledge and communication

nationally recognized teams and International Baccalaureate skills necessary to earn legal or federal internships while still in high school.

### THE NINTH GRADE YEAR

A successful transition from middle to high school is one of the largest indicators of future academic success. Our goal is to provide freshmen with an exceptional level of instruction in core content areas to serve as the foundation upon which their more specialized coursework will be based.

As ninth graders, students will earn eight credits toward graduation: English, Math, History, Biology, Spanish, Physical Education, Advisory, Music (.5) and Art (.5). Should students decide to begin their exploration of health careers, they may substitute their gym credit for a course in biomedical sciences. Students requiring reading intervention will take Reading Strategies (Read 180 or Just Words) instead of other electives.

Successfully balancing this course schedule will require a sense of discipline and scholarship that we will support through our school policies and expectations. It is essential that students attend our summer orientation so that we can begin the school year with a collective sense of community standards.

#### THE CAMPUS

Eastern has completed a transformative \$70 million renovation that preserved the classic architecture of the building while dramatically modernizing the facility. Features include Promethean boards in every classroom. wireless connection to the internet throughout the campus, band room/recording studio, athletic fields, science labs, a library/media center, greenhouse, two breathtaking atrium spaces, and a full service health center.
